## **Evacuation Checklist**

You Should Evacuate If	
<ul> <li>You are told to do so by the authorities.</li> <li>You live in a mobile home or temporary structure. These are NO safe from hurricane-force winds.</li> <li>You live in a high-rise building.</li> </ul>	You live in a designated evacuation zone that has been called to evacuate.

Preparation \	When Evacuating
<ul> <li>Designate a main location and a backup location to meet up after the storm in the event your family gets separated during the evacuation.</li> <li>Identify your nearest evacuation centers, when they will open and if pets are allowed, if necessary.</li> <li>Reach out to friends and family who live outside of the forecasted storm zone and create a list of potential evacuation locations.</li> <li>Designate someone to pack the car</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Stay calm! Evacuation orders are usually given before danger strikes.</li> <li>Listen to orders at least twice to determine evacuation locations, and print driving directions.</li> <li>Unplug appliances, turn off water at the main valve, and deactivate electricity at the breaker box.</li> <li>Pack your vehicle and go to your designated evacuation spot or backup location.</li> </ul>

information.  Gather local area maps in the event that mobile devices lack service or electricity.	If traveling to stay with friends or family, stick to evacuation routes until you are out of an evacuation area. Emergency professionals will be
